HOUSING STORY

Shepherd Center doubled the capacity of its SHARE Military Initiative when the program moved into Shepherd Center's new building at 80 Peachtree Park Drive. The purchase of the 15,000-square-foot building was made possible by a \$3.8 million gift from the Marcus Foundation.

SHARE, which launched in 2008 with funding from the Marcus Foundation, is a comprehensive rehabilitation program that focuses on assessment and treatment for service men and women who have sustained a mild to moderate traumatic brain injury and PTSD while serving in post-9/11 conflicts. SHARE clients participate in individual and group therapy sessions and see their Shepherd Center physician in the program's clinic. With the expansion, the goal is to double the programs reach, treating up to 100 SHARE clients annually.

"This latest generous gift from the Marcus Foundation will allow us to expand the SHARE Military Initiative, which is a huge need," says James Shepherd, co-founder and chairman of the board of Shepherd Center. "The new facility will allow SHARE to serve even more military service members so they can better manage the effects of injury as they transition into life after their military service."

The Peachtree Park Drive facility also houses a complex concussion clinic. Led by Russell Gore, M.D., SHARE medical director, the clinic focuses on patients who have sustained concussions, but have not recovered fully within a typical timeframe and/or those who have experienced complications. Patients are evaluated clinically by Shepherd Center's specialized medical team and undergo various types of therapy, if necessary.

Shepherd Center defines **community benefit** as a planned, organized, and measured approach to services and activities that specifically address the healthcare needs of people with spinal cord and brain injury, Multiple Sclerosis, chronic pain, other neuromuscular diseases, as well as the family or loved ones impacted. Patients at Shepherd Center get more than medical care, but receive the full continuum of care -- from evaluation and medical treatment to rehabilitation and lifelong support programs -- that extends back to their communities. Our patient population has unique needs that are typically underserved, which makes Shepherd an important lifeline and resource for our patients throughout their life.

Community benefit funding partially supports various value-added programs and services such as recreation therapy, animal-assisted therapy, patient outings, chaplaincy, assistive technology, peer support, back-to-school programs, and family programs. We also offer specialized programs tailored to adolescents, patients with dual diagnosis (both brain and spinal cord injuries), patients on ventilators, and patients with low-level brain injuries.
